



The SRC represented the school at the combined school march on Anzac Day. This year many students and their families from both our Primary and Secondary school campuses; represented our school proudly in the march.



SCHOOL CONTEXT

The Sathya Sai College (SSC) is a non-denominational, co-educational primary and secondary school catering for students from Kindergarten to Year 5 at the Murwillumbah Campus, and Years 6 -8 at the Dungay Campus in northern New South Wales. The unique and characteristic feature of SSS is its core values of Love, Peace, Truth, Right Action and Non-violence. Our school mission is "to provide and model a safe school environment, based on human values, which honours the uniqueness of all children, enabling them to realise their inner potential of character development and academic success".

We achieve our school mission by giving prominence to character development through a unique Sathya Sai Education in Human Values Program (SSEHV). Our students participate in a whole school SSEHV program which assists children in the development of positive and healthy relationships; a vital component in the life of a child and teenager. The quality of the relationship the student has with their peers and teachers affects the level of motivation, attitude and willingness to participate in any learning opportunity. Our weekly SSEHV program examines, teaches and promotes pro-active and pro-social behaviours that assist in creating a safe and supportive environment for students. Examples of situational values taught include patience, responsibility, tolerance, respect, care, kindness, integrity - to name only a few. These values are explicitly taught and explored using our seven teaching techniques of silent sitting, creative visualisation, quotes & affirmations, music & songs, storytelling, mind mapping and group activity.

Most importantly, we believe teachers should be role models by having unconditional regard for all. All staff members at SSC have made a conscious commitment to live the five human values in their daily lives. Our teachers strive to be exemplars of the values and encourage all students to practice the five human values thus providing students with a safe nurturing environment of respect and good role modelling. On the 9th of Oct 2017, Sathya Sai school (NSW) Inc. officially became Sathya Sai College Ltd. The

structure of both campuses continued to operate the same.

The College intends to continue to grow, one year level at a time, until Year 12, teaching mainstream NSW Board of Studies (BOS) curriculum filtered through our five human values. We offer literacy and numeracy enhancement programs, whole school sports programs, swimming and athletics, creative performing and visual arts, group and individual music programs, yoga and information and communication technology (ICT) programs.

The school plays an important role in the community by providing quality, tuition free education for all. This ensures all members of the community have ready access to a non-religious education system based on human values. Moreover we have a unique integrated service learning program where students from K-8 participate in service learning projects. Students render service to the elderly, the environment, animals and the less fortunate. By promoting selfless service, SSC provides students with the opportunity to rise above themselves and make a difference in their community.

We believe that the end product of education is character, the most valuable asset a person can have. Our children are the message we send to the future and our Sathya Sai Education in Human Values program encourages students to be conscious human beings.

The Primary Campus has modern buildings, including seven air-conditioned classrooms installed with BENQ smartboards and ipads, a resource centre, a music room and a school hall.

The Secondary Campus is on 10 acres, approximately 7 mins west of Murwillumbah. It has three general classrooms, a science laboratory, cookery room, music room, library and hall. There are plans to build additional classrooms, to cater for the expanding campus.

MANAGEMENT OF NON-ATTENDANCE

The process when dealing with absences from school is for parents / guardians to contact the front office by phone / email or written note informing the teacher and school about absences related to either sickness, or leave, that is approved by the Principal. Where no notice is given by parents / guardians, the reception staff will make contact after two days absence (on the third day) to ensure students need no further assistance.

Extended absences require written notice at least 2 weeks prior to the absence.

Written reasons for student absence are expected on the day of return to accommodate legal requirements stating that schools are accountable for attendance registers and information relating to student well-being.

Mandatory reporting procedures apply where absences are extended or the student may be at risk.

ENROLMENT POLICY

There were no changes in the school's enrolment form in 2017. The school's enrolment policy and enrolment forms are available from the school office and can also be downloaded from the school's website. Additional details are provided in the information pack that is given at the time of enrolment. The basic procedures for enrolment include:


- 1. All applications are processed in accordance with the school's enrolment policy.

- 4. Identify any strategies which need to be put in place to accommodate the applicant before a decision regarding the enrolment is made.
- 5. Inform the applicant's of the outcome.



All teaching staff meet the professional requirements for teaching in New South Wales and are committed to ongoing professional development and the concept of lifelong learning.



2017 HIGHLIGHTS AND NATURAL DISASTERS

Inclusion of Year 8

A highlight in 2017 for the Sathya Sai College was the Secondary Campus completed a full year at Dungay. It expanded the High School another year level and taught its first Year 8 class. Altogether there were 11 Year 8 students; 22 year 7 and 22 Year 6 students joined them, to take advantage of the expansive grounds.



The Primary Campus was flooded in term one, which caused the school to close in week ten as the ground level of the College needed to be evacuated, cleaned, painted, internal structures were rebuilt and floors recovered.





The Primary campus was awarded an Eco Schools grant which was used to implement a whole school sustainability focus. All students were instructed on recycling and encouraged to reduce the waste in their lunches. Classes were surveyed on waste production and reductions were awarded. An incursion from the Solo waste was held for all classes on recycling. Workshops were conducted for making Boomerang Bags and Bees wax wraps.

The Sathya Sai School community believe that education is not limited to academic excellence but must include character development through values education. The SSEHV program teaches children to understand respect and responsibility and how to develop healthy, loving relationships. Some of the methods used to assist the students to develop these skills in 2017 were:-



- Weekly EHV lessons
- Integration of the values into the wider curriculum
- School Buddy Program whereby Stage 3 students mentor and assist Kindergarten students' transition to Primary School and with various activities throughout the year.
- School Captain and Student Representative Council roles
- Anzac Day Ceremony
- Service Clubs

Service Learning and Environmental Education

The school continued to conduct integrated units of work through service learning which aim to foster self-discipline, self-sacrifice and self-less service to the community. Each class chose a service learning project as part of their integration into smiley clubs (Serving Mankind In Love Every Year)

The service projects included:-

Kindy & Class 5

During 2017, Kindergarten and their Year 5 buddies visited the Heritage Lodge Nursing Home for their Service Club. They focused on giving time to brighten someone else's day. While the residents have greatly enjoyed the visits, our students at Sathya Sai have gained much more in return.

During the visits, the students have performed some values songs as well as having the opportunity to also perform their Choral Speaking poems. The students made cards and small gifts to share with the residents. The students have shown many of the school values including love, kindness, understanding, compassion, sacrifice and selfless service. While the students love performing, the meet and greet session afterwards is so rewarding as the students get to know the residents. They always feel so welcome at the nursing home and look forward to every visit!





Year 1 has been learning all about dolphins and their environment.

They have gained a deeper understanding of the variety of dolphins, dolphin anatomy, diet, habitat, behaviours and ways to protect their coastal environment.

The projects Year 1 have undertaken throughout the year are;-

- A fruit stall at the cross country to raise money for Fingal Head CoastCare.
- Nurturing the school garden with Miss Kaye (term 1 & 2)
- Writing letters to the famous ecologist Jane Goodall, thanking her for her amazing contributions to our environment and telling her about how they are trying to make a positive change to the school and local environment.
- An excursion to Hastings Point to participate in an educational investigation of the local rocky shores and information on how to care for coastal habitats.

Year 1 have developed a deep and passionate understanding that they must show love and kindness to our beautiful world and to protect all living things.



Class 2

As part of the Year 2 Service Club commitments 'Care Bags' for the less fortunate within our community were assembled. The class brainstormed ideas of what items they should put inside the bags and ways to promote the cause within our school community. They held a whole school Mufti Day and asked families to donate toiletry items. The response was heart warming and they were eager to start sorting all of the donations so they could have the bags ready for distribution before Christmas! The enthusiasm of the class and their willingness to contribute ideas was impressive.



Year 3 were allocated garden beds to look after each week and grew a range of fruits and vegetables. Looking after the gardens allowed students the learning opportunity to study the growth of a variety of food and the responsibility of harvest together when it was ready.

With the harvested produce students had grown, they used it at different events to make food such as kale chips and pesto pasta, they sold lettuce and kale to the staff and families for a donation and also held stalls to sell mint and strawberry plants that they had planted. All money raised this year was put towards our Eco Schools project and supported the school to purchase further compost bins for our eating areas.

Year 3 really enjoyed participating in our Garden Guru's service club and giving back to our school and the community through our organic fruits and vegetables.





Year 4 service club focused on flora and fauna conservation issues within local, national and global communities. Through problem solving processes they identified a problem and ways to solve it. They developed ways to educate others on the importance of helping the animal and vegetation areas in need of protection.

After watching 'War on Waste' the students worked together and successfully petitioned Coles to make their soft plastic recycling bin more accessible. They were instrumental in getting Coles to adopt the RedCycle system. This means that locals can deposit all their soft plastics into the green bin at Coles and it will be turned into outdoor furniture.

They also received donated bins from Bunnings to use as soft plastic collection points for the 'Plastic free July' world wide initiative.

They are always looking for ways to live the values and protect the environment for future generations to come.



Year 6, 7 and 8 at the Secondary Campus, combined their services together to assist the Tweed Shire pound. A mufti day was held in term 2 and all gold coin donations were presented to the pound. Many students also donated a toy or suitable 'pet friendly' product which was presented to the Tweed Shire pound.





Mother's Day morning tea – The SRC students lovingly baked scones and prepared a Devonshire Tea for all the mother's, grandmother's and special female

friends who were able to attend.







Father's Day breakfast—Father's day breakfast was again lovingly prepared by the members of the SRC. The morning was also celebrated with a BBQ breakfast and a morning of family challenges!









Kinship Festival - The Kinship Festival is a local community event organised by the Murwillumbah community centre to celebrate families and Indigenous culture.

The Sathya Sai School community participated by manning a stall decorated with children's artwork and posters displaying the values. Face painting and a craft table was provided offering free art activities.













WELLBEING SUPPORT PROGRAMS

Wellbeing support programs are an opportunity for the whole class- or smaller selected groups to be involved in individual, targeted programs. The programs offered in 2017 aimed to enhance self esteem, resilience, self awareness, service and leadership, music skills, emotional literacy and coping with change. (Mentors included Isabela, Miss Kaye, Kate and Stephen Ward) The dedicated wellbeing and support team facilitated and conducted the following programs according to the age appropriate needs of the students.

- Friendship Constellations (Year 2)
- Fingal Coast Care (Year 2 & 3 boys and families)
- Kaleidoscopes Club (Year 3)

All children attended this event as part of their CAPA studies. It was an excellent opportunity for all children to be exposed to an opera that they may not otherwise have a chance to experience.


Grug and the rainbow serpent

Individual Music Programs

Once again, Sathya Sai School has offered individual music programs by continuing our partnership with the specialist music teachers for drums, violin and keyboard.

Students were offered individual tuition with specialist music teachers and had timetabled lessons which were on a rotation so students did not miss the same lesson in the classroom.

The affordable opportunities for music lessons are in keeping with our philosophy of providing education which is experiential and transformational in character. Music and songs are part of the seven teaching techniques and provide students with the opportunities to practice self-discipline and self-sacrifice while learning an instrument.

SPORT

Sathya Sai students were provided many opportunities to participate in a wide variety of sports during 2017. This ranged from school house sports at lunch time to state wide independent school's competitions. Sport is a very popular and important component of the school curriculum, not just for developing physical fitness, skills and co-ordination, but to also assist students to understand the importance of values such as co-operation, perseverance, right conduct, respect and courage. The school was granted sports funding from Sporting Schools which was used to cover the cost of touch football, athletics coaching and gymnastics for the junior students and soccer for the senior students.






